## An Evening Lecture with Malcolm Saulis

### Putting Indigenous Traditional Knowledge To Work 7:00 to 8:30, Wednesday, November 1, 2017

The eighth Emmanuel Evening Lecture will help us learn more about how indigenous traditional knowledge can be applied to address today's issues. How can traditional knowledge help craft social policy, find solutions to First Nations' health-related issues, design better programs, and advance use of restorative justice?

Our guest speaker will be Malcolm Saulis, a Malecite Indian from the Tobique First Nation in New Brunswick. He holds honouring of Indigenous knowledge as his most important academic work. Prof. Saulis is a First Nations scholar who has been working for many years on the evolution of an *Aboriginal Wholistic Traditional Research* program.



Until his recent retirement, Malcolm Saulis was a Professor of Social Work at Wilfrid Laurier University. He is recognized as a Traditional Circle Keeper and receives teachings from many Elders. He now advises government on the design on programs and how to work effectively with indigenous people in their communities.



Prior to re-locating to Waterloo, Malcolm and his family were active members of Emmanuel United Church. We look forward to welcoming him back to Emmanuel.
